Santa Monica Mountains Fund (SAMO Fund) is the official nonprofit partner to both the National Park Service (NPS) and California State Parks (CSP) in the Santa Monica Mountains. Established in 1988 by local citizens, SAMO Fund was founded to support the preservation, restoration, and public enjoyment of these iconic lands.

**Our mission** is to support education, resource protection, ecological restoration, research and community engagement that preserve the ecological and cultural elements of the Santa Monica Mountains National Recreation Area. We work in partnership with the National Park Service, California State Parks, and local organizations to ensure these public lands remain vibrant, resilient and accessible to all.

**Grow Resilient Funding:** Strengthen financial sustainability by diversifying revenue streams, engaging donors, forming partnerships and improving impact measurement.

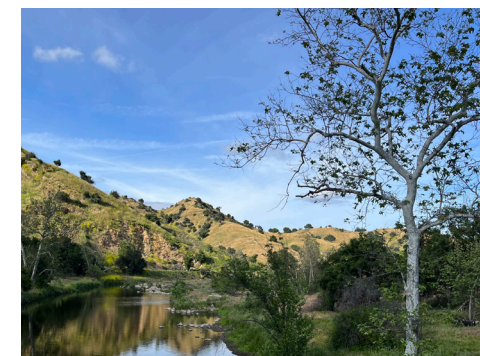
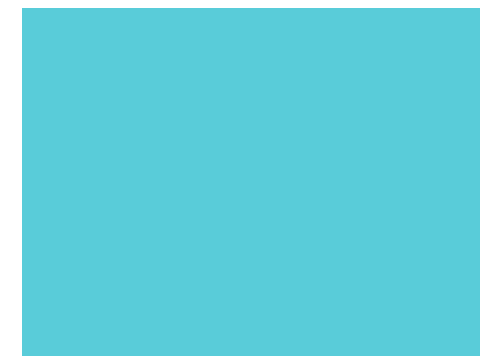
**Increase Visibility:** Amplify awareness and engagement through targeted communication, outreach and community events to broaden the Fund's presence.

# PROGRAMMING & PROJECTS

SAMO Fund Succeeds

## Monarchs and Milkweed

SAMO Fund's nursery offers complimentary milkweed and various native plants to individuals interested in contributing, in exchange for a small commitment of volunteer hours. In 2025, thousands of native narrowleaf milkweed seeds and plants are distributed to residents and community members who aim to support the migration of monarch butterflies.

## Native Plant Nursery

Over 125,000 native plants are grown here annually, curating a world-class herbarium for current and future scientific research. Native seed collection ensures conservation-quality seed samples of over 600 species of the plants native to the Santa Monica Mountains. Interns, entry-level workers and volunteers are educated on California native plant botany, horticultural practices and habitat restoration techniques.

## Project Nursery at the Wallis Annenberg Wildlife Crossing

SAMO Fund is one of several partners involved in establishing a native plant nursery aimed at cultivating suitable flora. These plants will be utilized for the Wallis Annenberg Wildlife Crossing, enhancing animal habitats and seamlessly integrating the crossing into the connected ecosystems, thereby supporting the biological microsystems crucial for sustaining life.

## SAMO Youth

SAMO Youth provides employment experience and mentorship for students aged 18-30 interested in pursuing environmental careers. Established in 2000, with just 10 students, the program now has hundreds of alumni and serves new cohorts annually.

## Break the Poison Chain

A joint campaign with NPS to provide information on how to avoid using rat poison when dealing with pest problems on your property. Educational yard signs and resources are used by community members to spread the message.

## Native Seed Farm

Our Seed Farm grows native plants to restore fire-damaged and degraded landscapes across the Santa Monica Mountains. Staff and interns collect, clean, and propagate seeds from local ecosystems, producing thousands of plants each year. The farm also serves as a training site, teaching young people restoration skills and supporting regional biodiversity and climate resilience. Seeds cultivated at the farm are grown at the Native Plant Nursery.

## Oxnard Youth Ecologists ("OYE") workforce program

The OYE program offers paid opportunities for high school students interested in environmental science careers, providing hands-on mentorship through real conservation projects across Ventura and Los Angeles counties. Participants gain practical experience in habitat restoration, wildlife monitoring, native planting, invasive species removal, and climate resilience work: building the skills and confidence to stand out when entering the workforce.

## Cultural Preservation

The area is home to over 10,000 years of human history, having been inhabited by the Chumash people and then ranched in the 19th century before urban development. SAMO Fund supports archeological research working with NPS on the cultural resources team, as well as cultural activities at the Satwiwa Native American Indian Culture Center.

## Open Outdoors for Everyone

Open Outdoors for Everyone is jointly managed by SAMO Fund, providing an education program for 4th graders from Los Angeles and Ventura Counties. This complimentary program brings around 20,000 4th graders to the park for a day of adventure and learning with National Park Service and State Park Rangers.

## Restoring the Park

When disasters strike, SAMO rebuilds. 5 key areas affected by wildfires and ranching, Paramount Ranch, Cheeseboro Canyon, Rancho Sierra Vista, Peter Strauss Ranch and Rocky Oaks, are now home to 100,000 new plantings.

## Trail Maintenance

Santa Monica Mountains National Recreation Area offers over 500 miles of trails for hiking, biking and horseback riding, providing public access to hills, canyons and streams throughout the mountains. SAMO Fund works to help maintain, improve and restore routes throughout the mountains.

## Wildlife Research and Protection

Our research initiatives conducted in partnership with the National Park Service, and collaborating scientists support wildlife research and help scientists better understand wildlife movement patterns, habitat connectivity, and the impacts of urban development on native species.

## Volunteer Support

Volunteer programs assist the National Park Service, California State Parks, and partner park organizations throughout the Santa Monica Mountains. These programs include the Mountain Bike Unit, National Trails Day events, Public Lands Day activities, habitat restoration volunteer days, and other stewardship activities that engage community members in caring for public lands.
